NEW PRAYER BOOKS TO BE USED FOR HIGH HOLIDAYS

Bat Yam has acquired eighty new High Holiday prayer books to replace the Gates of Repentance *Siddur* published more than forty years ago. The new books, entitled *Mishkan HaNefesh*, are a two-volume set, one book for use on *Rosh HaShanah* and the other for *Kol Nidre* and *Yom Kippur*. The new books feature fully transliterated liturgy, expanded options for *Torah* readings, study texts that provide background and context, contemporary poetry, alternative readings, and rich commentary drawing from Jewish tradition and essays by the leading Reform Movement thinkers. They are also more gender inclusive and LGBTQ friendly.

Bat Yam members and friends of the congregation may purchase honor and/or memorial bookplates to be permanently placed in the new prayer books. The cost is \$36 (two times *Chai*) per book. RABBI FUCHS REFLECTS

A Trip to Savor

Our congregation's joint trip to Israel with Sanibel Congregational UCC exceeded my fondest expectations!

The only previous interfaith journey to Israel I had undertaken was one that I co-led with an anti-Israel Arab professor from the Hartford Seminary twenty year ago. It was not a joyful experience. While I tried to present and model an open-minded, "let's listen to both sides of the conflict," perspective, the professor took us to a Palestinian village where his selected panelists heaped venomous attacks on the very existence of the Jewish State as we sat in the beautiful auditorium of a community center built for that Arab village by the Government of Israel. When the Professor begged off our visit to the Holocaust Memorial at *Yad Va-Shem*, claiming he did not feel well (he was absolutely fine that evening), I truly regretted having agreed to co-lead this "journey of understanding."

By contrast, our joint trip this summer was an absolute joy. There were forty-two in our group, almost equally divided between Christians and Jews. My UCC counterpart, Rev. Dr. John Danner, was a model of sensitivity, open mindedness, wisdom and pastoral concern.

For me, one of the true highlights was accepting the invitation of Rabbi Ada Zavidov to deliver the *D'var Torah* at *Kabbalat Shabbat* services at *Kehilat Har El* in Jerusalem, the oldest Reform synagogue in Israel. On this visit to *Har El*, I spoke in English for the benefit of my wonderful group of fellow travelers about the vital principles of human conduct found in the Holiness Code, Leviticus, Chapter 19. It warmed my heart to know that every idea I expressed was an ideal that Dr. Danner and his congregants could wholeheartedly affirm. Our religious differences are real, but we share common moral values and a fervent desire to use our respective faiths as springboards to help repair our broken world.

It was the second time in 5779 that I had the privilege of preaching at *Har El*. The first time, in October, I spoke in Hebrew about the lessons of the stories of Noah and the Tower of Babel. Then I was visiting my son Leo, who at forty-two years old made the decision to begin rabbinical studies and spend his first year of the five-year graduate program at Hebrew Union College in Jerusalem. His address to our group this spring was a genuine highlight of our trip.

Leo has an extensive Jewish background, but he knows well there is no shortcut to becoming a genuinely credentialed rabbi. The day-in, day-out interactions with professors and other students are absolutely essential to a rabbi's legitimacy.

A shortcut course and a bit of flair and charisma may help one become an effective leader of worship, but to become a rabbi, worthy of that venerable title, takes years and years of full-time concentrated study. Anything less is akin to calling an EMT a physician.

On our recent trip, it was just as important to me and my fellow Jews as it was to the Christians in our group to visit the holy places of their religion. Worship at the Church of the Redeemer in Jerusalem on Sunday morning, visits to the Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem, the Church of the Annunciation in Nazareth, and the opportunity for our Christian friends to re-experience baptism in the Jordan River were moving experiences for us Jews to better understand Christian roots and practices. While scrupulously respecting boundaries, Pastor Danner offered loving and Jewishly affirming explanations that enhanced all of our understanding. I'd go with him again, to Israel or any other place of mutual interest.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I was going to start this column with a warm welcome to fellow congregants, guests and friends as we enter the High Holy Day season after a long and climate-warming summer. But as I began to write, terrible news reports started coming through about yet another mass shooting, this time at a Walmart in Texas, by another avowed gun-toting white racist nationalist (soon to be followed by a mass shooting in Dayton, Ohio, motive not clear at the time I'm writing). Another, another, another...and it became impossible not to first reflect on this increasing threat to America, which is to say, of course, a threat to us as Jews.

Rabbi James Rudin was kind enough to lend me a recently published book entitled *Behold America, The Entangled History of "America First" and "The American Dream"* by Sarah Churchwell, an American professor of literature and public understanding of the humanities at the University of London, UK. Churchwell covers in great detail the rise of the Ku Klux Klan, lynchings, white nationalist supremacists, American fascist black shirts (who, according to Churchwell, carried a banner in an Atlanta march, proclaiming, "Back to the cotton patch—nigger—it needs you; we don't") and the German American Bund, all spreading their hate and xenophobia during the end of the nineteenth and first half of the twentieth century. At the height of its power, with millions of members and supporters nationally, the Klan dominated local governments in five states and targeted at least six other states for political control while many politicians remained silent in the face of the Klan's onslaught.

Churchwell warns that "the enemy of democracy is authoritarianism in the many guises Americans had been discussing for the previous thirty years [meaning 1900-30]: tyranny, yes, but also special interests, corruption, plutocracy and oligarchy, crony capitalism and corporatism, and the various forms of rising totalitarianism, as tyranny went corporate." She affirms that "Every generation would have to fight the battle anew; every generation would find ordinary Americans called upon to resist the impact of authoritarianism, to reclaim the democratic dream of liberty, equality and justice."

Of course, none of the conflicting struggles about which she writes is new, especially after white nationalists have committed mass murders in this country and abroad. According to FBI statistics, there have been eight mass shootings in the United States since 2017 in

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which the shooters espoused white supremacist views. Yet, the president has said that he does not see white nationalism as a rising global threat.

So, whether we soon come together for our High Holy Days for meditation and introspection on Sanibel or elsewhere, and pray for a better year in our personal lives and our society at large, the traumas and lessons of the past are ever present with us. The old challenges remain, only dressed, if at all, in slightly different clothing. Sadly, Faulkner's often quoted statement, "The past is never dead. It's not even past," is as true today as when he wrote it in 1951.

Cheryl and I wish you all a meaningful and contemplative High Holy Days, full of the awareness, courage, health and strength needed to face personal and societal challenges in the coming year.

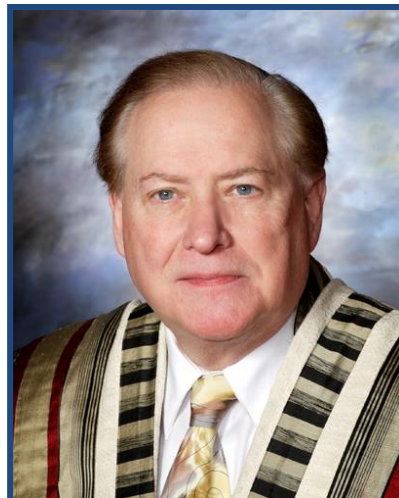
The honey jars were shipped in mid-August to arrive in time for *Rosh HaShana* greetings and wishes for a sweet New Year.

FROM OUR CANTOR

Dear Friends,

The summer is drawing to a close and we turn our focus to the approaching High Holy Days – or “Days of Awe” or *Yamim Nora-im* as it is referred to in Hebrew. It is interesting to note that the nomenclature, *Rosh HaShanah*, is not mentioned in the *Torah*. Rather, this observance is known by other names in the Bible. The observance of the New Year is called by various scriptural names: *Yom Teru-ah*, the Day of the Sounding of the *Shofar*, *Yom HaDin*, the Day of Judgement, *Yom HaZikaron*, the Day of Remembrance and, finally, *Yom Harat Olam*, the Day of the Birthday of the World. In the *Torah*, *Yom Kippur* is called *Yom HaKippurim*, the Day of the Atonement/s – or as one clever observer called it, “the Day of At One ment” and is also known as *Shabbat Shabbatot*, the Sabbath of Sabbaths.

Whatever these “Days of Awe” are called, we are reminded that this is a special period of serious personal reflection and introspection. This year at *Bat Yam*, we will be using a new *machzor* or High Holy Day prayer book entitled *Mishkan HaNefesh*, or Dwelling Place of the Soul. May it inspire us to approach these days of introspection with humility and meaning so that we will be more attuned to the very best of our instincts to do good for the New Year.

Let us welcome the New Year of 5780 with joy, hope and wonder. May it be one of good health, contentment and fulfillment for you and all your loved ones. Toby joins me in wishing all of you a *Shannah Tovah*!

GROUP TRIP TO ISRAEL JOINS TWO CONGREGATIONS IN FRIENDSHIP AND ADVENTURE

Last spring, forty-two adventurous travelers headed to Israel for a tour presented jointly by *Bat Yam* Temple of the Islands and SCUCC. As it turned out, the group was divided nearly equally between the congregations.

The tour, which offered unparalleled experiences in legendary locales, was the result of many months of collaborative effort. Barry Roth and then-president Alan Lessack were instrumental in planning and organization. *Bat Yam's* Rabbi Dr. Stephen Fuchs and the Rev. Dr. John H. Danner, Senior Pastor of SCUCC helped to create the ambitious tour itinerary and traveled with the group. Throughout their time in Israel, they offered insights and provided opportunities for discussion.

Tour Highlights

- May 1 – Visit to excavations of Jerusalem dating back to the time of King David. The group entered the Old City at Zion Gate and explored the ancient Jewish Quarter and the Western Wall Tunnels.
- May 2 – Tour of Bethlehem, with the Church of the Nativity. Back in Jerusalem, Mount of Olives holy sites including the Garden of Gethsemane and the Church of the Holy Sepulcher. On Mount Zion, David's Tomb and the Last Supper Room. The "Tower of David Night Spectacular" show in the Old City.

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- May 3 – Tour of the *Yad VaShem* World Holocaust Remembrance Center and a geo-political tour of Jerusalem. The colorful open-air marketplace. *Kabbalat Shabbat* worship at Congregation *Har-El*, where Rabbi Fuchs preached and Pastor Danner offered greetings to the congregation. Following the service, a home hospitality “*Shabbat of a Lifetime*” dinner.

- May 4 – Outdoor adventures: a trip to the Judean Desert, with cable cars to the summit of Masada for a tour of Herod’s desert mountaintop fortress. Then an opportunity to float effortlessly in the ultra-salty Dead Sea and relax at a beachfront spa.
- May 5 – Sunday service at the Lutheran Church of the Redeemer in Jerusalem’s Old City. Viewing the Dead Sea Scrolls and more at the Israel Museum. Trip to Galilee, stopping on the way at the site of Jesus’ baptism and the location where the Israelites crossed the Jordan River after their forty-year journey from Egypt. Traveling along the Jordan River Valley, viewed the Sea of Galilee and the Mount of Beatitudes. A cruise on the Sea of Galilee concluded with dinner at a waterfront restaurant in Tiberias.
- May 6 – At the historic center of Jewish mysticism in the Galilean highlands, met with a Kabbalistic artist. Explored the Golan Heights in an off-road jeep tour and viewed Israel’s neighbors from the summit of Mt. *Ben-Tal*.
- May 7 – Walking tour of Nazareth and the Church of the Annunciation and a spice farm in Bethlehem. Visited a restored Templar Colony village. Saw Caesarea, Herod’s Roman amphitheater and grand palace on the beach, and Herzliya, Israel’s innovation hub on the Mediterranean Sea.
- May 8 – Israeli Memorial Day: saw a secret underground munitions facility where pioneers who helped establish modern Israel are honored. A cross-cultural encounter with Israel’s Ethiopian community included a cooking workshop and a traditional Ethiopian-style lunch. At *Netiv HaAsara* on the frontier with Gaza, visited with a woman who, as a ceramic artist, has created an interactive peace project on the border wall where rocket attacks regularly occur.
- May 9 – Israeli Independence Day: In Tel Aviv, explored the ancient port city of Jaffa. Before a Yemeni-style closing dinner, saw an inspiring model for coexistence organized by an Islamic cleric, peace activist, and educator and his Jewish wife.

DURING RECENT VISIT, RABBI MYRA SOIFER SPEAKS ABOUT HER PEACE CORPS SERVICE

On July 25, Rabbi Myra Soifer, former rabbi of *Bat Yam Temple of the Islands*, was in Fellowship Hall at SCUCC to present a fascinating program about her experiences as a Peace Corps volunteer in Panama. Her presentation was titled "What's an Old Jewish Gal Doing in a Place Like This? Myra, Maira, or Mayra Goes to Peace Corps." (She explained that the title of the presentation reflects the fact that her name is spelled three different ways in Spanish.)

Rabbi Soifer, who was visiting Fort Myers and Sanibel on a brief leave from duty, has been with the Peace Corps in Panama since February 2018. Her term will end in March of 2020. It's hard to believe that my Close of Service is only 8 months away.

UPDATE ON SOCIAL ACTION COMMITTEE ACTIVITIES

The *Bat Yam* Social Action Committee is continuing its focus on asylum-seeking immigrants in our midst. We had a bus trip scheduled with other immigrant activist groups to go to the Florida Child Detention Facility in Homestead, but Homeland Security mysteriously evacuated the facility a few days before we were scheduled to go. We do not know where they took the children.

We continue to work with Lee County Legal Aid, Lee County Hispanics, and Catholic Charities of Immokalee to support Immigrant Know Your Rights sessions. We are also involved in a task force led by Adonia Simpson of Americans for Immigrant Justice (she led our Know Your Rights training session last April) to plan an Immigration Summit for Fort Myers.
