JOINT INSTALLATION SERVICE IS SET FOR JANUARY 5th

Rabbi Paul J. Citrin will officiate at the joint *Bat Yam* installation service of Rabbi Fuchs and Cantor Simon on Friday, January 5th at 7:30 pm. His sermon topic will be "The Keys to A Flourishing Congregation". Other Sanibel clergy and officials will also take part in the special *Shabbat* service.

Rabbis Citrin and Fuchs were classmates in rabbinical school, and Rabbi Citrin shared a pulpit with Cantor Simon in Boston. A native of Los Angeles, Rabbi Citrin was ordained by the Hebrew Union College in 1973. Now retired, he currently serves as the rabbi of the Taos, NM Jewish Center on a monthly basis. He co-founded the Jewish-Catholic Dialogue of Albuquerque, which now includes Protestants and Moslems. He was also on the board of the Martin Luther King Multicultural Council, which provides college scholarships to minority students. He served as president of the Pacific Association of Reform Rabbis and as a board member of the Central Conference of American Rabbis. He is the author of a children's novel *Joseph's Wardrobe*, and co-author and editor of several other books.

Rabbi Citrin will also present the rabbi's portion of the *Shabbat* morning class the following morning, January 6th, *Torah* study based on Parashat *Shemot*: "Exodus and Jewish Identity".

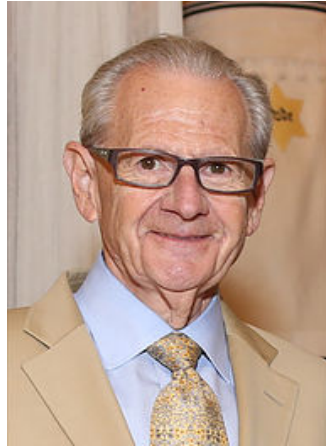
"SEASON OF LIGHTS" CELEBRATION PLANNED

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



I am writing this article with the visual image of Thanksgiving and its message very much on my mind. The first Thanksgiving, held by the Pilgrims who left England seeking religious liberty started an important tradition.

As a people who have experienced the evils of discrimination, evictions from their homes, separations from their families and mass killings, the message of this day resonates. It is a day when we need to think of the 64 million individuals around the world who are searching for a safe place to live, bring up their families, and worship freely. Unfortunately, we have experienced a year in which hate has become fashionable and used in the political process, not only here in the U.S. but in many other places around the world. The Jewish community, perhaps more than any other group understands the dangers posed by extremists.

In early November, Edina and I attended a Road Scholar trip in Santa Fe and Taos, NM which focused on the Conversos and Crypto Jews. Two of the presenters were Conversos, and their stories were fascinating. In 1492, the Jews of Spain were ordered to leave the Country or convert to Catholicism. Many left and others did convert; some did, but practiced their Judaism in secret. If exposed, they were taken to the Inquisition Courts and tortured. If they recanted they were forced to wear dunce caps and a special tunic for three years. If they did not recant, they were burned at the stake - all in the name of religion.

This experience reinforced for us that as a people we must speak out, because we know, from history and experience what our failure to do so means. You need only to look at areas of Fort Myers and Immokalee, where over 20,000 Haitians live and work. They play an important role in our economy, and many of their children were born here. They will be forced to return to their country, which has over 80% unemployment and is still not rebuilt. Hospitals and schools are gone. Should we be silent?

RABBI FUCHS REFLECTS



Chanukah: Beyond the Cruse of Oil Rabbi Stephen Lewis Fuchs

For all my years as a rabbi I have tried to teach in every venue at my disposal – pulpit, classroom, office, anywhere I can – that the Festival of Chanukah is not really about a cruse of oil that lasted for eight days. That wonderful legend is about as central to the real meaning of Chanukah as Santa Claus is the reason our Christian neighbors celebrate Christmas.

The real story of Chanukah is long and complex, but here is its essence, and the vital lesson it can teach us today. Long ago in Judaea (about 165 BCE), it was a time of peace and prosperity. The Assyrian Greeks and their King Antiochus ruled over Judea, but they were content to leave the Jews alone as long as they paid their taxes and there was peace in the streets.

At this time there were basically two types of Jews living in Judaea. There were Jews who were loyal to their religion and to our Covenant with God. They understood that God had called Abraham and Sarah and their descendants (who included them and us today) to

1. Be a blessing
2. Follow God's teachings and live worthy lives
3. Use their talents to create a society built on justice and righteousness.

These Jews believed that if they did these things, then in return, God would:

1. Protect them
2. Give them children
3. Make them a permanent people
4. Keep them safe in their ancient land, the land then known as Judaea

There was another group of Jews at that time as well. Most of them were wealthy and thought it would be to their advantage if they were more like the Greeks. They thought their Jewish customs and religious celebrations made it harder to have good relationships and make profitable business relationships with wealthy Greek businessmen.

In order to accomplish this goal, this second group of Jew stopped practicing their religion. They wanted to see Judaea become a Greek city-state. If that happened Judaea could coin its own money, which would be a great advantage in business. So instead of studying Torah, observing Holy Days and Festivals, and living Jewish lives, they hung out
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in the Greek gymnasia where they could make lots of good business contacts.

Well, to make a long story short, there was so much tension between these two groups of Jews that soon they started fighting with each other. Only when he saw that there was violence in the streets of Judaea, did Antiochus send in his troops. He outlawed all Jewish practice and polluted the Temple with idols of Greek gods, and offered sacrifice of pigs (a forbidden animal for Jews) to them.

The Maccabees fought against the Assyrian-Greeks for three years and

finally drove the foreign troops out of Judaea. They fought for the first time in history for the cause of religious liberty. And they won!

The lesson, though, is an important one for today. When we take our Judaism for granted, when we neglect to study and practice it, we endanger its survival. That is the real lesson of Chanukah. May we celebrate the Festival of Lights with joy and pride in our precious heritage!

LECTURE AND
LUNCHEON
SEMINAR ON
JANUARY 14 AND 16*

The Reverend Dr. J. Clinton McCann, Evangelical Professor of Biblical Interpretation at Eden Seminary in St. Louis, is the Shared Scholar Program 2018 speaker. His topic will be "The Psalms as Doorway to Interfaith Dialogue." The lecture is scheduled for January 14th at 3 p.m. in the sanctuary of the Sanibel Congregational UCC. A reception in Fellowship Hall will follow. The program is open to the public.

Dr. McCann will also offer a luncheon seminar in the UCC Fellowship Hall from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Tuesday, January 16th. He will be joined by composer and musician Richard Bruxvoort Colligan in an exploration of the ways peace and justice concerns are reflected in the Psalms and in other songs. Mr. Colligan is a 21st-century psalmist, composing community songs around the psalms as he teaches and workshops congregational singing focused on lifelong spiritual formation. He holds an MA in Theology and the Arts from United Theological Seminary of the Twin Cities and is currently working toward a Doctor of Ministry from Eden Theological Seminary. This luncheon seminar is also open to the public with no admission fee, but you must sign up if you wish to attend.

In preparation for the Shared Scholar's visit, The Reverend John Danner, Senior Pastor of the Sanibel

Congregational UCC, will present the second session of his two-part introductory course to the work of the Dr. McCann on December 6th, at 10:00 a.m. and 7 p.m. (the 7 p.m. session is a repeat of the 10:00 a.m. class). The class will be held at the church's Fellowship Hall. The course is titled "God's Claim Upon the World: An Introduction to the Psalms and the Work of J. Clinton McCann."

Dr. McCann is Evangelical Professor of Biblical Interpretation at Eden Seminary in St. Louis, Missouri. He earned a Ph.D. from Duke University in 1985 and joined the Eden Seminary faculty in 1987. His research and writing focuses on the Psalms. A noted biblical scholar, his publications on the Psalms include *The Shape and Shaping of the Psalter* and *A Theological Introduction to the Book of Psalms: The Psalms as Torah*.

The Shared Scholar program is co-sponsored annually by *Bat Yam*, the Sanibel Congregational United Church of Christ, St. Michael and All Angels Episcopal Church, First Church of Christ Scientist, and Captiva Chapel by the Sea. *Bat Yam's* sponsorship is provided by the Leo Rosner Foundation in honor of June Rosner.

Adele Anish and Marcia Rudin are co-chairing the reception following the January 14th program.
