

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



As I noted in my column last month we started the new year with deeply moving and inspiring services led by Rabbi Fuchs.

In October, we participated in a very moving *Simchat Torah* service. For those not in attendance, try to visualize five long tables lined up end to end measuring forty feet in length. Members and guests sat on either side facing the tables. The Ark was opened, and everyone who wished to had an opportunity to walk the *Torahs* around the room.

Rabbi Fuchs then took the Holocaust *Torah* and laid it on the table. Tanya and Mike Hochschild at one end and David Berger and Miriam Bailey on the other began to unroll the sacred scroll. Using the *Yad* (pointer), Rabbi Fuchs walked alongside the scroll, recreating the various bible stories and events in each of the five books culminating

with the actual reading of the last portion in Deuteronomy followed by the first portion in Genesis. The beauty of this holiday recognizes that life is a continuum – thus, as we complete the last words of the scroll, we begin again. That image of the circle of life is symbolized in the design of the wedding band as well.

Mel Bleiberg, our founding president, reminded us when this Holocaust *Torah* was brought to Sanibel. There was a joint celebration held in the main sanctuary with members of *Bat Yam* and the Congregational Church in attendance. The *Torah* was unrolled down the length of the aisle with members of both congregations holding the edges. That ceremony speaks of the unbroken relationship we have shared with the SCUCC for over twenty-six years.

Looking ahead, beginning with our service on Friday, November 3rd, we will welcome our new Cantor, Murray Simon. The awesome power of his music along with the outstanding insights we experience each week with Rabbi Fuchs will add depth and beauty to our worship experience.

I would be remiss if I did not express my personal thanks, along with our board, to all the volunteers who ran services from May to September. We can truly say we serve our Jewish community on Sanibel, Captiva and Fort Myers year round.

RABBI FUCHS REFLECTS



To Seek the Blessing

In November we celebrate Thanksgiving. In November also our *Torah* readings take up the story of Jacob. In my mind these two seemingly different topics dovetail beautifully.

Life can often be very difficult. In 1936, at the height of the Great Depression, **Governor Wilbur Cross of Connecticut** appealed to the indomitable human spirit in his Thanksgiving proclamation: "It has seemed good to our people to join together in praising the Creator... for the blessings that have been our common lot ... for honor held above price; for steadfast courage and zeal in the long search after truth; for liberty and for justice... that we may humbly take heart of these blessings as we gather once again with solemn and festive rites to keep our harvest Home." With these mighty words Governor Cross looked beyond the ravages of the Great Depression that affected every citizen and

inspired the people of our state to seek and find the blessings in their lives.

It was the same quality exhibited by our patriarch Jacob who also overcame trial and tribulation to seek and find a blessing from God.

But, you might ask, "A blessing! What right and what hope should Jacob have had to seek a blessing from God?" Had he not taken advantage of his older brother Esau to extort the lion's share of the family inheritance from him? Had he not stood before his blind father swearing he was Esau in order to steal his father's blessing? People often ask, "Why does an unsavory character like Jacob become Israel, the namesake of the Jewish people? Why do you take your name from a trickster and a thief?"

It is a good question, and it has good answers. First of all, Jacob paid and paid for his evil deeds. We would not be wrong if we counted the years after he left home as twenty years of hard time in the Laban Penitentiary in Haran. Laban tricked him time and again, and "often," Jacob exclaimed, "scorching heat ravaged me by day and frost by night. Sleep fled from my eyes."

Second, he honestly and eagerly sought Esau's forgiveness, and he did not merely attempt to placate his brother with empty words. The size of the gift Jacob insisted Esau accept –and to his credit Esau was reluctant to do so– more than compensated his brother for the loss of the birthright inheritance.

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And last and most important, Jacob is our role model and our namesake because despite every reason for doing so, he refused to give up hope. He stumbled and fell, as we all do. He paid for his misdeeds many times over. And when it seemed that all was lost, he wrestled with everything he had been and everything that he had done. He proclaimed to the

Eternal One in the midst of his struggle, "I will not let You go until You bless me." (Genesis 32:27)

Though the encounter left him wounded, he wrenched genuine blessing from the depths of his anguish and found the ability to face the future with courage and hope. In that, I submit, he is a wonderful role model for all of us!

RABBI FUCHS RECEIVES PRESTIGIOUS AWARD

At a dinner in Nashville, TN on Tuesday, October 17th, Dr. Emilie Townes, Dean of the Vanderbilt University Divinity School, presented the 2017 Vanderbilt Divinity School and Graduate Department of Religion Distinguished Alumni/ae Award to Rabbi Stephen Fuchs.

The Divinity School award is given "to someone who has demonstrated excellence and distinction in justice-making through their work in congregational ministry, religious institutions, ecumenical organizations, community-based organizations, government or other social institutions." The Graduate Department of Religion award is given "to someone whose scholarship, teaching, or research has advanced the understanding of religion and its formative impact in the world."

Rabbi Fuchs earned his doctor of ministry in biblical interpretation from the Divinity School at Vanderbilt University in 1992. Upon accepting the award, Rabbi Fuchs said, "I am most grateful for the opportunity Vanderbilt gave me to deepen my ability to understand and interpret biblical stories."

CLASSES TO

JANUARY SHARED
SCHOLAR LECTURE

The Reverend John Danner, Senior Pastor of Bat Yam's host church, will present a two-part introductory course to the work of the January, 2018 shared scholar Dr. J. Clinton McCann. Danner's course is titled "God's Claim Upon the World: An Introduction to the Psalms and the Work of J. Clinton McCann." Reverend Danner will teach the classes on Wednesdays November 29th and December 6th, at 10:00 a.m. and 7 p.m. (the 7 p.m. session is a repeat of the 10:00 a.m. class) at Fellowship Hall of the Sanibel Congregational United Church of Christ.

Dr. McCann will present his program focusing on Psalms as a bridge to interfaith cooperation at the church on the afternoon of Sunday, January 14th. A reception will follow. He will also offer a workshop on Tuesday, January 16th dealing with music in the life of religious congregations.

Dr. McCann is Evangelical Professor of **Biblical Interpretation at Eden** Seminary in St. Louis, Missouri. He earned a Ph.D. from Duke University in 1985 and joined the Eden Seminary faculty in 1987. His research and writing focuses on the Psalms. A noted biblical scholar, his publications on the Psalms include The Shape and Shaping of the Psalter; A Theological Introduction to the Book of Psalms: The Psalms as Torah: The Psalms commentary in The New Interpreter's Bible (Vol.. 4, 1996; Preaching the Psalms; and Great Psalms of the Bible. He is active with CROP/Church World Service. Bread for the World. Heifer International, and International Partners in Mission and especially interested in the intersection of religion and culture. Committed to the importance of multicultural education, he has led groups of students to Guatemala, Costa Rica, and El Salvador.

The Shared Scholar program is cosponsored annually by *Bat Yam*, the Sanibel Congregational United Church of Christ, St. Michael and All Angels Episcopal Church, First Church of Christ Scientist, and Captiva Chapel by the Sea. *Bat Yam's* sponsorship is provided by the Leo Rosner Foundation in honor of June Rosner.

In the late afternoon of Wednesday, October 4th, approximately thirty *Bat Yam* and UCC members met under the *Sukkah* decorated in front of the church to hear Rabbi Fuchs' explanation of the harvest festival and the *Iulav* and *etrog*. Reverend John Danner, the senior pastor of the church, also spoke at the event. Afterwards everyone enjoyed a delicious potluck dinner in Fellowship Hall with food contributed by members of both congregations.

On Monday October 9th, Rabbi Fuchs explained the fall harvest holiday to seven children and two teachers from the UCC's church school as they stood under the *Sukkah*. According to Rabbi Fuchs, the children asked many excellent questions and participated actively in the celebration.

WHERE IN THE WORLD IS RABBI MYRA SOIFER?

Rabbi Myra Soifer flew to Cuenca, Ecuador on Saturday October 7th to begin her month of learning Spanish in the morning and volunteer activities in the afternoon. She reports she is really enjoying the Spanish classes and her afternoon teaching of young children. She is also is enjoying the food and has discovered a good local orchestra, a jazz club, and a dance studio where she is taking dance lessons.

And she has made contact with the Jewish community there.

According to Rabbi Soifer's recent blog, "I had a long and lovely brunch this morning with four members of the Jewish community of Cuenca...All were North American. Their stories are fairly characteristic...of many of the ex-pats here...

"The Jewish community of Cuenca is small. Its major gathering is for the Passover Seder, when they have thirty to forty in attendance (their Matzah comes by way of the Chabad rabbi in Guayaquil). They are mostly North American, but there are a few Ecuadoran Jews, and an occasional Jew from elsewhere in South America among them. Most are in the retirement age range, but there are a few families with kids. Aside from Passover, they gather for Rosh

HaShanah dinner and, from time to time, for general social get-togethers...

"In the national cemetery here in Cuenca there is a distinctly identified Jewish section with approximately twenty-five graves. The biggest influx of Jews into Ecuador, in general, was composed of refugees fleeing Hitler. There was apparently an Ecuadoran 'Schindler' who granted Jews visas for a period of about six months before the government fired him. Don't know his name or many firm details...Once the war was over, most of those Jews left Ecuador for Israel or the U.S."
